Greetings ECSU Community,

The G. R. Little library team and I would like to provide you some updates with the new edition of our electronic newspaper as we continue the 2020-2021 academic year. Thank you for your patience,

continuous support, and contribution to making the library achieve its vision. It has been an honor and pleasure to lead the G.R. Little Library as we meet our library users' demands. During COVID-19, as ECSU is transitioning to new virtual teaching platforms, the library is also adopting new technologies, purchasing new databases, and strengthening its commitment to serving library users both in traditional and alternative ways. We completed a library survey before the Fall term started to get some feedback and suggestions from our library users during the transitioning period.

While seeking new ways to support our library users, the library collaborated with the Center for Teaching Excellence by inviting a guest speaker through a virtual platform. The library team recently successfully presented a faculty workshop that will be part of the upcoming workshop series to assist online teaching. The library's efforts continues to center around its Vision, to be" "the intellectual and technological commons of Elizabeth City State University and the educational leader in preparing students for success as information literate global citizens and lifelong learners." Besides adopting new technologies, we are preparing to re-open the main library that has been under renovation since January 12, 2020.

The renovations are nearly completed, and we are very excited to open our doors soon with repurposed space for library users and new furniture. To prepare our library staff and the physical locations for the upcoming academic year, we continue to apply various grants (Dena Epstein Music Library Association grant, Archives Radio Grant, and ALA based grants). We recently were awarded a grant from the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) under the provisions of the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) that is administered by the State Library of North Carolina. The items acquired by the funds of this grant were spent successfully towards purchasing supplies for the library using them to fight the COVID-19 virus.

This year, the G. R. Library has been following conversations about diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) in the country and the University of North Carolina (UNC) system. As a result, the library has created a Diversity and Inclusion committee. The committee is tasked to create activities and focus on resources to enrich the library collection and further meet the library's Vision Statement.

As we continue to strive for excellence, we are confident, you will find what you are looking for as you enter our library, whether physically, electronically, or through our online remote access services. Should you have any requests or concerns, please bring them to our attention. We will do our best to fulfill them.

We look forward to you visiting the G.R. Little Library, and we invite you to ask questions and provide suggestions and feedback on our collections, services, and physical space.




education and research and with extensive metadata to help with your art research.

Since August 2018, with the vision of Director of Library Services, Dr. Juanita M. Spence, G. R. Little Library's open-access institutional repository *NC DOCKS* is continuing to increase the visibility of ECSU while increasing the visibility of faculty/staff and students' profiles. While *NC DOCKS* centralizes, preserves, and makes ECSU's intellectual capital accessible and carries it to the world, it also gives a new purpose to the modern library to provide a platform to its users to showcase their intellectual content. The materials that can be uploaded in *NC DOCKS* can be either published (research-related works) or unpublished works (materials that are created for teaching purposes, slides, sound recordings, videos, music scores, thesis, research papers, photographs, pictures, student papers and works) from ECSU faculty/staff and students that represent their academic work.

Music Library Corner



The G. R. Little Music Library serves as a satellite location of the G. R. Little Library since April 2013 when it was first opened. Since the Fall of 2018, the new music librarian, Nurhak Tuncer, continues to develop the Music Library collection and serves as the instruction/liaison librarian to the Music and Visual Arts department. She is also working on developing the music collection by assessing the collection and adding new titles to the catalog. Nurhak also has the responsibility of supervising and training student assistants, who are learning how to utilize the music library resources. Printing is free of charge for library users. Resources in the Music Library include music scores, the literature on music subjects (biographies, bibliographies, reference resources, etc.), CDs, DVDs, and print music magazines and journals. The music library is open for all ECSU students interested in exploring

music-related subjects and the public in general. Please check out the Music Library Website (located on the ECSU's main library page) for additional updates and hours. It is operating under ECSU's COVID19 guidelines and accepting one or two students at a time. The music librarian is available online via virtual platforms for library instruction and reference.


This year, music librarian applied to a research grant (Dena Epstein) to make Leonard Ross Ballou's "Early American Negro Musicians: 1695-1900" hand guide available to researchers. Ballou's research is significant to American Music History, mainly because it includes an annotated bibliography of valuable primary resources that he carefully curated. Ballou was known for his research and archival skills. He kept precise, organized documentation of African-American Music's very early resources that many have been either lost today or still sitting in the dust to be discovered. His research is a significant contribution today as there is still a gap in early African-American musicians' research in American Music. The musicians that he noted in his research are not known to many researchers. Therefore, Ballou's work needs to be made visible to a broader audience.

Student Corner

It has been a tradition to include a student corner in the library newsletter. For this issue, we chose a music student and interviewed David Whitaker from the Music and Visual Arts department, who is proud to be a Viking!

Tell us about yourself, your major and how did you come to ECSU please?

Interlibrary Loan Services



The library's Interlibrary Loan (ILL) service allows the borrowing of materials from more than a thousand libraries nationwide. While the G.R. Little Library facility has been under repairs and the university has transitioned to more online, less face-to-face, ILL has become a vital service to meet Vikings' needs. During the 2019-20 academic year, 86 ILL borrowing transactions were completed for materials needed by ECSU faculty, staff, and students. The materials requested were mostly academic in nature, but there were some

leisure reading materials thrown in by some dedicated readers in Viking-land. The 2020-21 academic year is off to a busier start for the ILL service, with 38 transactions in August 2020, more than four times the number of requests processed in August 2019.

Archives and WRVS 89.9 Collaboration



Historically, HBCU radio stations are valuable communication outlets for their communities and are visited by prominent local and national figures who want to spread a message. This was especially true in the Civil Rights Era, with powerful movement figures granting interviews to these college/university radio stations. As a result, this has created a collection of vibrant and significant recordings that speak directly to the fight for civil rights and the voices of those who were on the front lines. However, historical recordings at college stations do not always find a home in their University's archives. The relationship between university radio and television stations

and university archives is generally underdeveloped or not there at all. To correct this oversight, and with a bit of coaching from the HBCU Radio Station Archival Survey Project organizer Jocelyn V. Robinson, WRVS-FM 89.9 and ECSU's Archives are building a new archival collection of historic recordings and technology to preserve the invaluable collection of recordings and radio artifacts tucked away within the University's possession. With a small grant from the HBCU Radio Station Archival Survey Project and additional support from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting's Community Service Grant, a new archival metal shelving section has been purchased for the Archives to house materials currently in WRVS's storage facilities. This will allow the materials to be re-housed into the Archives' environmentally controlled storage area and for the materials to begin the cataloging and inventory process. In the future, funding will be sought to make digital copies and transcriptions of the recordings, so they are accessible to researchers.


Hot NEW Arrivals
