#### PURPOSE OF THE UNIVERSITY

North Carolina Central University offers undergraduate instruction in the arts and sciences and in business and education. In addition, it conducts a number of graduate programs leading to the master's degree in these areas. The University offers post-graduate, first-degree professional programs through its Schools of Law and Library Science.

The University's authority to offer instruction and to confer degrees derives from The University of North Carolina through its Board of Governors, under the legislation which created the unified University of North Carolina on October 30, 1971.

Through the undergraduate program (and to some extent through the graduate and professional programs) attention is directed to the achievement of the following:

- 1. Development of perspective and intellectual strength for the endeavors of a lifetime.
- Acquaintance with our cultural heritage as a background for understanding and relating to the existing social order.
- 3. Provision of a climate for high-quality learning with special emphasis on education for knowledge and an intelligent, responsive participation in the home, the community, and a career.
- 4. A liberal education with a number of opportunities in specialized education so that students are prepared to pursue various professional careers with confidence and competence.
- 5. Recognition of the need for continuous learning throughout one's life in order to be effective, responsible citizens in a rapidly changing society.

#### HISTORY

North Carolina Central University, a state-supported liberal arts institution, was chartered in 1909 as a private institution and opened to students on July 10, 1910. It was founded by Dr. James E. Shepard. From the beginning, when it was known as the National Religious Training School and Chautauqua, its purpose has been the development in young men and women of the character and sound academic training requisite for real service to the nation. To this end, the training of all students has been entrusted to the most capable teachers available.

The institution's early years were characterized by a wealth of enthusiasm and high endeavor, but not of money. Private donations and student fees constituted the total financial support of the school, and the heavy burden of collecting funds rested on the President.

In 1915 the school was sold and reorganized, then becoming the National Training School. During this period of its history Mrs. Russell Sage of New York was a generous benefactor of the school.

In 1923 the General Assembly of North Carolina appropriated funds for the purchase and maintenance of the school; thus in that year it became a publicly-supported institution, and was renamed Durham State Normal School. Two years later the Legislature converted it into the North Carolina College for Negroes, dedicating it to the offering of liberal arts education and the preparation of teachers and principals of secondary schools.

At its 1927 session the General Assembly began a program of expansion of the college plant to conform to the needs of an enlarged academic program. The interest of the Honorable Angus W. McLean, then Governor of North Carolina, and his belief in the institution aided greatly in the promotion of this program. State appropriations were supplemented by a generous gift from B. N. Duke, and by contributions from citizens of Durham in 1929.

The College was accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools as an "A" class institution in 1937 and was admitted to membership in this association in 1957. It has since been approved by the Association of American Universities and the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education and holds an "A" rating with the American Medical Association and the North Carolina State Department of Public Instruction.

The 1930's afforded federal grants and State appropriations for a new program of physical expansion and improvement of educational facilities; this program continued until the beginning of World War II.

The General Assembly of 1939 authorized the establishment of graduate work in liberal arts and the professions. Pursuant thereto graduate courses in the Arts and Sciences were first offered in that same year; the School of Law began operation in 1940, and the School of Library Science was established in 1941.

In 1947 the State Legislature changed the name of the institution to the North Carolina College at Durham.

On October 6, 1947, Dr. James E. Shepard, the founder and President of the college, died. The Board of Trustees appointed an interim committee consisting of Dr. Albert E. Manley, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences; Miss Ruth G. Rush, Dean of Women; and Dr. Albert L. Turner, Dean of the School of Law, to administer the affairs of the institution until the election of the second president.

On January 20, 1948, Dr. Alfonso Elder was elected President of the institution. At the time of his election, Dr. Elder was serving as head of the Graduate Department of Education and had formerly been Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Dr. Elder retired September 1, 1963.

On August 9, 1963, Dr. Samuel P. Massie was elected as the third President of the College and assumed the office on September 1, 1963. Dr. Massie came to the institution from Washington, D. C., where he was Associate Program Director for Undergraduate Science Education of the National Science Foundation and Professor and Chairman of the Department of Pharmaceutical Chemistry at Howard University. He resigned on February 1, 1966.

The Board of Trustees appointed an interim committee consisting of William Jones, Business Manager; Dr. Helen G. Edmonds, Graduate Dean; and Dr. William H. Brown, Professor of Education, to administer the affairs of the institution until the fourth president took office.

On July 20, 1966, Dr. Albert N. Whiting was named fourth president of the institution. He came to North Carolina College from Baltimore, Maryland, where he had been Dean of Faculty of Morgan State College. Dr. Whiting served as President from July 1, 1967 until June 30, 1983.

In 1969, during Dr. Whiting's term of office, the State Legislature again changed the name of the institution to North Carolina Central University. On July 1, 1972, North Carolina Central University became a constituent institution of the University of North Carolina.

On July 1, 1983, Dr. LeRoy T. Walker, became Interim Chancellor of the University. He has also served the institution as Chairman of the Department of Physical Education and Recreation, Head Track Coach and Vice Chancellor for University Relations.

### HIGH PRIORITY GOALS ACCORDING TO PROGRAM CLASSIFICATION STRUCTURE

The Planning and Budgeting Council of North Carolina Central University has reviewed and revised the goals of the institution and classified them according to a structure consistent with the reporting requirements for the budget. The goals marked with an asterisk (\*) have been chosen by the Academic and the Non-academic Planning and Budgeting Committees as those to be emphasized during the 1983-1985 budget biennium.

#### I. INSTITUTIONAL ADMINISTRATION PROGRAM (6.0)

- To assure the organization effectiveness and continuity of NCCU by (1) providing for planning and executive direction, (2) providing for administrative and logistical services, (3) enhancing relationships with NCCU's constituencies, (4) providing services and conveniences for the employees of NCCU, and (5) recruiting and admitting students to the NCCU educational program by accomplishing the following objectives:
  - \*1. : To improve the recruitment system and to offer scholarships and financial aid based on financial need as well as on academic excellence.
  - 2. A&E#2: To establish a reputation that would be more competitive with predominantly white institutions that are currently attracting the caliber of students that we wish to enroll, enabling us to be more competitive in our recruitment efforts.
  - \*5. A #2: To acquire the resources necessary to support teaching, research, and learning, both directly through the administration's own efforts, and indirectly through provision of information on funding sources and other matters to faculty and students.
  - 6. F #1: To encourage excellence in teaching.
  - 7. F #2: To attract and retain highly qualified faculty.
  - 8. A #8: To develop and maintain a planning and budgeting process that will ensure that accountability, efficiency and effectiveness are evident in the implementation of the goals and objectives of the University.
  - 11. SA #1: To implement an improved registration system.
  - 13. LR #2: To support and strengthen the academic, research and cultural programs of the University by continuing the efforts of faculty and staff to increase and improve resource development.
- \*16. ST #8: To give priority to the employment of additional staff personnel in understaffed areas.

#### II. INSTRUCTION PROGRAM (1.0)

- To elicit, through an organized instructional program, some measure of educational change in students of NCCU. Educational change includes (1) the acquisition or improved understanding of some portion of the body of knowledge, (2) the adoption of new or different attitudes, and (3) the acquisition or increased mastery of a skill or set of skills.
  - 3. I #1A: To assure the mastery of basic communication skills and to provide for their continuous reinforcement throughout the University. (p. 32 #1)

#### III. STUDENT FINANCIAL SUPPORT PROGRAM (8.0)

- To provide financial assistance to students in the form of outright grants, trainee stipends, and prizes, awarded by and/or administered through NCCU.
  - 4. SA #7: To broaden a scholarship program designed to attract students of high academic potential without concern for financial need.
  - : To supplement financial aid funds available from federal and state sources for students with demonstrated financial needs.

#### IV. ACADEMIC SUPPORT PROGRAM (4.0)

- To support directly one or more of the three primary programs (Instruction, Research, Public Service) by carrying out activities (1) related to the preservation, maintenance and display of both the stock of knowledge and educational material, (2) that directly contribute to the way in which instruction is delivered or research is conducted, (3) directly related to the administration of academic programs, and (4) related to the professional development of academic personnel.
  - 9. I #2B: To assure that all accrediting agency criteria and appropriate professional group standards are met by the departments and schools of the University. (p. 32 #4)
  - 12. AT #2: To continue to strive for high levels of professional training in law, nursing, business, education, and library science.
  - 14. AT #1: To maintain the quality and strengthen, as necessary, programs at the master's level.

#### V. PHYSICAL PLANT OPERATIONS PROGRAM (7.0)

- To maintain existing grounds and facilities, provide utility services, and plan and design future plant expansions and modifications.
  - 10. SP #3: To make every effort to encourage a physical environment conducive to educational, moral, cultural, and aesthetic growth.

#### VI. STUDENT SERVICE PROGRAM (5.0)

- To contribute to the emotional and physical well-being of the students, as well as to their intellectual, cultural, and social development outside the context of the formal Instruction Program.
  - 15. C #1: To develop a comprehensive counseling program (e.g., medical, academic, vocational, social, emotional, and financial).










