I also appreciate the biographical information for each of the entries, as many photo based blogs on Tumblr don't include much information with the picture leaving me wanting to know more. Submit your own pictures or just enjoy browsing the blog, but I wouldn't miss out on this one, which highlights some very interesting individuals in from our profession's past.


