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Imposed Problems: A Social Portrait

In Imposed Problems: A Social Portrait, Lemuel Subdias created a series of portraits to display how the community and society shapes one's personality. Lemuel has always had a fascination with portraits and the narrative found in visual portraits. In order to create a narrative of people other than himself, he studied and interviewed three subjects to better evaluate and understand the personalities of his subjects. He chose subjects who classify themselves as minorities on a social level in the United States. Prior to making the artwork, he composed an interview with each subject separately. He interrogated each subject with the same 50 questions, while recording both audio and video of the interview. The questions included questions from Carl Jung and Arthur Aron's 36 questions to fall in love that Lemuel had come across after reading a *Washington Post* article, suggesting these questions lead to love. He had asked the questions to a close friend and learned a lot about the friend so he decided to ask the same questions to the subjects. The video and audio of the video is used in creating video portraits of the subjects. The subjects were also asked to submit photos and videos portraying elements they hold a strong connection to.

The final product was a digital video portrait of each subject. The videos show a primary subject as a silhouette with an barrage of distorted images flipping by in the background. There is a balance of still images and moving elements in these videos with a focus of contrast in various forms including color.

The portraits were created based on prior knowledge of the subjects as well as knowledge received through interviews. The media accumulated from the

subjects were based on their interpretation of "images and videos that show things that mean a lot to you." With it, the following videos were edited to create the series *Imposed Problems: A Social Portrait*, "Miguel, Kianna," and "Demetrius."

All of the subjects have mentioned mental illness as a social problem and stated how it had affected each one of them. When creating each piece, the theme of depression was at center. Each subject stated that depression had impacted their mental health so in order to create a visual representation of a mental illness, inner turmoil was depicted as distortion. Balance between chaos and stability was portrayed using items and symbols that would make each subject at ease.

In "Miguel," the subject was a minority in ethnicity. The subject was of Hispanic descent, with fair skin and identified as a heterosexual cisgendered male. The subject mentioned the social problems he identified with, which include economic instability, mental illness, and domestic abuse. In this video, three videos were created to separate the subject's "personalities." They were titled *TINT*, *GOAT*, and *Miguel*. *TINT* and *GOAT*, both represented an inner turmoil within the subject. *TINT* showed the subject's appreciation and love for his culture and environment, while it still displayed a coldness and sadness through the color. *GOAT* displayed his favorite animal (the goat) while it also played on the acronym for Greatest Of All Time. After a rough period in his life, the subject had an increased sense of self esteem and is visually portrayed through fire. The distortion of the goat video in the background was representational of the favorite animal and acronym, while it also showed how the subject saw himself.

In "Kianna," the subject is a minority in color and gender. The subject was Black and identified as a heterosexual cisgendered woman. The subject also mentioned the impact mental health has on her. Out of the three subjects, this subject was the most discriminated. During the interview, the subject revealed her father passed away when she was young. This had a definite impact on her sense of self. She kept a quilt created out of her late father's shirts. This was used as an overlay on top of the overall video to display an interesting texture. The subject was diagnosed with anxiety and depression and this was displayed visually through the distortion of videos in the background. Included was also a symbol of the subject's favorite book, titled "The Song of the Sparrow," in the form of a literal sparrow, and her emotional support animal, Jaxon.

In "Demetrius," the subject had also dealt with depression at a young age. He was a heterosexual cis-gendered Black male. He was introverted but showed a lot of energy when engaged in conversation. Family was important to the subject, considering he was raised in a single parent household, whom was also involved in the military. Since the subject had suffered through depression, he found joy in other matters. When asked to submit photos and videos, he submitted landscapes, posters of concert festivals, photos of friends and family, and photos of the subject's skateboard. The subject had also mentioned his favorite animal was a duck which was incorporated into the video as well. All of these elements were taken to create a video collage.
